



CHEBOYGAN — A RECREATIONAL PARADISE

Northern Michigan's Straits Area boasts countless recreational opportunities. Winter, spring, summer, and fall, each season brings an array of activities for the outdoorsman or sports enthusiast to enjoy.

One of the area highlights is Northern Michigan's Inland Waterway. This unique waterway system connects Lake Huron with 40 miles of lakes and rivers, passing through quaint villages along the way. There's something for everyone to enjoy on this journey . . . from slow moving, winding rivers, to expansive lakes.

Two of Michigan's largest inland lakes, Mullett and Burt, are part of the 40 mile chain. Both bodies of water are perfect for swimming, water skiing, jet skiing, and fishing. Miles of public shoreline, including Aloha and Burt Lake State Parks and Cheboygan's Gordon Turner Park, provide for more recreational opportunities, such as sunbathing and picnicking.

f winter is more your season, the Cheboygan area offers over 350 miles of groomed snowmobile trails. Cross-country ski

trails also abound, with a new series of beginner, intermediate, and advanced trails at the Black Mountain Recreational Center. For those who prefer downhill skiing, two outstanding ski resorts are just 45 minutes away.



Cheboygan's recently completed ice rink/pavilion offers men's, women's, and youth hockey leagues, as well as open skating hours. Locker rooms, concessions, and skate rental are also

available at this impressive new facility.

he fringe seasons of spring and fall offer their own special recreational choices. Spring brings fishermen to the area in search of their prize catch. With 50,000 acres of lakes, and 80 miles of rivers and streams in the area, fishermen will find an outstanding variety, including perch, walleye, trout, bass, salmon, and sturgeon.

There are few spots where fall colors are as vibrant as in





CHEBOYGAN Opera House



The Opera House, originally constructed in 1877, played an important role in the history of the colorful lumbering era in Northern Michigan. Twice ravaged by fires and rebuilt in 1888 and 1903, the facility now harmoniously houses its original combination of City Hall, Police



Department, Fire Department, and the 582 seat Opera House.

n 1984, after having been closed for some twenty years, the elegantly restored Opera House re-opened its doors to the public once more. Managed by the Cheboygan Area Arts Council, with the support of the Michigan Council For Arts and Cultural Affairs, this acoustically superb, Victorian theatre has become the focal point for entertainment and the performing arts in the Straits of Mackinac area and beyond.

Open all year, The Opera House presents an outstanding variety of live performances. Audiences have enjoyed



It is also used extensively by local community theatre groups such as The Rivertown Follies and the Northland Players, in addition to being used for workshops, seminars, business meetings, art and dance classes, educational programming and rentals. The Opera House is a member of The League of Historic American Theatres and the Association for Performing Arts Presenters.
