Once a bustling industrial community, Fayette manufactured charcoal pig iron between 1867 and 1891. It offers visitors the unmatched serenity of a Lake Michigan harbor, white dolomite bluffs and verdant forests. This well-preserved museum village recalls a time when it was a noisy, bustling mining town with an immigrant population that shared daily hardships, joys and sorrows.

Daily Attractions

- Modern visitor center
- 20 historic buildings, including the furnace complex, town hall, hotel, company office and homes
- Museum exhibits, outdoor walking tour and scenic overlooks
- Guided tours available (mid-June through mid-August)
- Playground, semi-modern camping, picnicking and swimming available in the park

Hours:

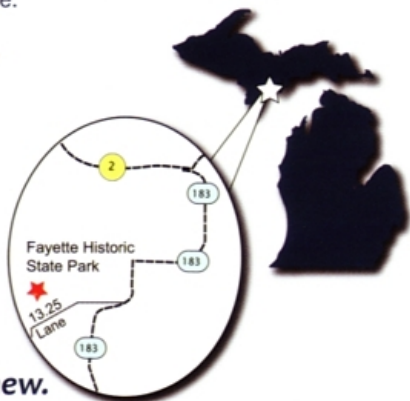
9 a.m. to 5 p.m., mid-May through mid-October.

With extended hours 9 a.m. to dusk, mid-June through Labor Day.

A Recreation Passport is required for entry. Michigan residents, \$10, non-residents \$8 for a daily permit or \$29 for an annual permit. Partially wheelchair accessible.
